



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Pin trading's top 10 pins

Top 10 pins as of Wednesday, March 6,1996

1. Transportation — This one is shaped like the Arctic Winter Games bus which you have seen traveling around the silver loop during the games. Only 300 were produced, so see your friendly bus drivers to try to strike your best bargain! This one should be good for at least a two- or three-to-one trade!

2. CBC North — This pin is square with twin circles depicting the circumpolar map of the world and the logo of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. There were 800 pins produced, but only 500 of them came to Alaska with the remainder being distributed to CBC staff across northern Canada.

3. The Chugiak - Eagle River Host Society pin. This one is gold and looks very much like the gold "Baba" pin out of the gold, silver, bronze set that was issued except it has "Host Society" on the lower right side. Make sure you get the real thing. Look for Chugiak - Eagle River board members they have trading stock and you should be able to strike up a great deal!

4. Any volunteer pins. People had to work really hard for these and you'll have to have a silver tongue to talk them out of one, but hey, you never know - they might want something you've got and be willing to trade! There are six pins; 25 hours, 50 hours, 75 hours, 100 hours, 150 hours and 200 hours.

5. One of the most coveted pins is the wooden lasered "Officials" pin sponsored by the Rural Discount Center. These

are VERY hard to find and getting the off cials to part with one will take some our standing negotiating skills. This is one that you REALLY want to find!

6. The "Spirit Ring" pin was sold out b Monday morning. This is the round whit pin with the various animals, ulus an symbols radiating off from the corporat seal. This was bringing a three-for-on trade on Tuesday!

7. TEAM NWT's logo, the Polar Bear, i always a hit! This set of games is no ex ception.

8. The Yellowknife 1998 society pin is ou and about. This one is really going to be rare because it depicts a ptarmigan on i and the mascot has been changed since this pin was issued. It's a great looking gold rectangle so be on the lookout!

Haven't seen too many of the Yukon pins. The Team pin seems to be available but the others have been a little harder to come by.

10. The Team Alaska pins are out there, but not readily available. We have seen a few athlete pins, but not many others. The most unusual one is a solid gold State of Alaska pin with the corporate logo on it. There are only 10 of these produced, so you'll be lucky to even see one! Keep your eyes open and who knows ... maybe you'll spot one.

Don't forget to ask Media people and Anchorage Police officers for their pins, this is the first time a police department has ever issued a special pin just for the Arctic Winter Games!

Mayor Mystrom remembers the Games

Having been a good sprinter and hurdler in high-school I decided to compete in some event in the 1974 Arctic Winter Games in Anchorage. Curiously I attended the tryouts at Park Strip to watch, apprehensive to participate. I asked an official, "when is the 100 meter race to be held"?

"The race was held 45 minutes ago," he said, "if you want to do a time trial I'll time you", he offered. So I borrowed some snowshoes and then I hid behind some cars to practice because I had never been on snowshoes. When I was comfortable I went back to the man. "I'm ready," I told him. And I prepared for my first snowshoeing time trial.

For the first 50 meters 1 concentrated on remaining on my feet without catching the snowshoe tip. It worked, so I pushed myself a little more in the last 50 meters.

"Twenty-one seconds," shouted

"Twenty-one seconds," shouted a voice as I crossed the finish line.
"You're on the team," I was told. I had no idea that my time was the fastest time of the day. I was very excited I had made the team.

I was a snowshoer without snowshoes. I bought a pair at Eberhard's Sporting Goods and practiced until I was able to get a time of 15.5 seconds in the 100 meters. My time was half a second behind the North American Record.

The games started. The "big guy" to beat was competitor Brian Long from the Northwest Territories, Canada. He was their national snowshoe champion. In the preliminary trials I competed in four different heats against six to eight competitors. This would decide who would be in the finals. I ended up in the same heat as Brian.

The gun sounded and Brian was off to a tremendous start. At the 50 meter mark he was two strides ahead of me. I quickened, catching him at 95 meters and we crossed the finish line in dead heaf! We were the two top finishers and went on to the finals.

The finals were later that day with eight competitors. Brian with a fast start was ahead but I was not far behind. At the 50-meter mark he was two strides ahead of me. I knew I could beat him!

I pulled ahead a yard with 20 meters to go. But then, I caught the tip of my snowshoe and fell. The whole field rushed past me. I felt really terrible. I competed in the 400 meters later that week and took 4th or 5th place. I didn't medal.

Eventually I made Team Alaska for the 1976 winter games in Sheffordville, Quebec, Canada. My son's tonsillectomy the night before departure forced my withdrawal.

I went on to win the Fur Rondy snowshoe races nine out of the 12 years I competed. My snowshoe legacy continued

My snowshoe legacy continued with my oldest son, a hockey competitor in the 1984 Arctic Winter Games in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, Canada.

My experiences as an athlete in the Arctic Winter Games remain constant; the comraderie of the athletes, the competition, the spirit. We competed for the fun of the sport. The Arctic Winter Games was amateur athletics at its best

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Athletes arrive, volunteers fix glitches

Anchorage International Airport took on the air of a family reunion this weekend as competitors from Canada, Greenland, Russia and northern Alaska arrived to participate in the 1996 Arctic Winter Games

Hundreds of tired but excited athletes were greeted by volunteers from the Arctic Winter Games, representatives from Anchorage and Eagle River and even Monte the Moose, the official mascot of the Anchorage Convention and Visitors Bureau.

As with any multi-million-dollar event involving thousands of people, there was a lot to be done before athletes could be processed, loaded into buses and taken to their tempo-

rary homes at the "villages" in Eagle River. There were also a lot of last-minute glitches to be dealt with, said Games executive director Dan Sullivan

Right off the bat, it was learned that the team from Magadan, Russia was going to be late getting into the country. "The plane couldn't land, there was no safety certification," Sullivan said.

He explained that the type of plane chartered by the team did not meet American safety standards. The team switched to an Aeroflot flight, but didn't arrive until early Monday

Sullivan said the group was taken to their accommodations and fed, and then taken straight to their competitions, many of which began Monday morning as well. "They didn't get much rest, but they're a hearty bunch,

Games volunteers had other minor catastrophies to deal with as well. "There is so much to something like this that you don't even realize it until it gets started," Sullivan

From athletes missing their buses to athletes missing a meal and wanting boxed lunches to the wrong kinds of floors at venue sites, volunteers have been using their imaginative and diplomatic skills to overcome obstacles of all kinds.

Virginia Thomas, chair of the Arctic Sports committee, received the first Fair Play pin award for her role in solving the Gruening Middle School floor problem. Ian Legaree, technical director for the International committee, awarded the pin Monday

'The pin is awarded to someone who goes above and beyond to instill a sense of the

spirit of the Games," he said. It was for that the tile-on-concrete floor at the sch wasn't suitable for some of the events to held there. Thomas was integral in both so ing the problem by finding a covering for floor and working with the athletes.

"Our goal is every day to look at what going well," Sullivan said. "There have be more successes than obstacles and the unteers have proven incredibly efficient hard-working.

The way we see it, we'll get it figu out," he said.

One of the unexpected happenings co be described more as an achievement tha problem. "Our merchandise store is sell out already," Sullivan said. "We though had enough in for the whole two weeks.

The store is ordering more items and pects them in soon, he added.

stead of a one foot high kick.
"The competitor has three attempts at the height which the ball is at. They come to the ball, kick with both feet and land with both feet," described Master of Ceremonies Steven Kaparik.

Unlike many of today's sports, camaraderie is one of the biggest elements of Arctic sports. "That is the beauty of these games,"

commented Kaparik

Teams representing Alaska, Northwest Territories and Tyumen competed together in the two foot high kick. Though the Tyumen athletes were unsuccessful in their jumps, competitors came very close to the ball and provided exciting entertainment for the spec-


tators and other competitors.

She tried out for Team Yukon this year, she said, "and managed to make the eam."

Snowshoeing, the 29-year-old Whitehorse resident said, "is not a flashy sport, but it's still very tough. It's not forgiving." That's why the hot tub sounded so good as she looked forward to the evening.

"I was very lucky today," Tamara said modestly of her first-place finish in the 5k. "It's a really tough course, with lots of hills. We had a fast start and the first half took all our energy. In the second half, it was just a matter of getting home."

Of the 1996 Winter Games, Tamara said, "It's been fantastic, seeing all the different cultures. I've never been in something like this. I'm very honored to be here."

As to what has most impressed her about the Winter Games in Eagle River: "Alaskans are very friendly people, just wonderful," she said.


"They are already at a calibre well above the rest," said Augestad, himself Alaska's table tennis singles champion.

In an informal game Monday against Magadan's Roman Kalabine, Augestad was defeated 21-18. "But I didn't get a good warmup and I didn't have my shorts on," said the coordinator with a laugh. A rematch is tentatively scheduled for later in the week.

With round robin competition only two days along, both Teams Tyumen and Magadan are undefeated. In fact, neither has lost a game in the best two-of-three games to 21 format.

Augestad said the sport of table tennis is blessed with the most distinquished past players as judges. The four courtside judges are all former Olympians, two from Canada and two from the United States. Former worlds doubles champion Jimmy McClure (1937-38) is the equipment director for the table tennis champion of the Arctic Winter Games.



Team Alberta strikes gold — pins that is

Team Alberta has struck gold -gold "Fair Play" pins that is. The team has been on both the giving and receiving end of the new awards being handed out at this year's Games.

"I think it's really something when these kids are heartbroken they didn't get a medal and can still come off the ice and show sportsmanship," said Arlene Beaudet, mission staff for Team Alberta.

Wendy Garratt, Steven Magill and Ian McFatridge, all speed skaters, were awarded the "Fair Play" pins on Tuesday for being good sports despite disappointing races on the oval.

Beaudet said Games officials presented the skaters with the pins and explained what an honor they are.

"They just couldn't believe it," Beaudet said Vicki Leonard-Gilbert, chef de mission for Team Alberta. She said Kabn was "totally

Alberta to receive the honor. However, Alberta's wrestling coach was the first to give a pin.

Travis Kahn, 15, the Team made Alberta wrestling squad in the 112 pound slot. Kahn suffers from Crones Disease and has to take a prescription drug containing ste-

roids. Since he qualified for the team, he has gained five pounds.

"Usually if you're a wrestler and you're over the weight category, you can't compete,"

Alberta's coach really wanted to include Kahn in the Arctic Games so he contacted the International Committee and explained the situation.

The chefs de mission voted to let Kahn participate in the next weight level up, giving Alberta two wrestlers in one cat-

egory and no one in the 112 spot.
"It was very precedent setting. It showed

great sportsmanship," Leonard-Gilbert said.

Once Kahn and his team arrived in Eagle River, the wrestling coaches from all teams had a meeting. The Alberta situation was brought up at the meeting.

Not only did the coaches support the Committee's decision, they voted to let Kahn wrestle at the 112 weight — although he is still five pounds over weight.

"We certainly didn't expect that," Leonard-Gilbert said. She said the coaches felt that even though he had an extra five pounds, he didn't have extra strength and were worried about his safety with the big-

ger, stronger wrestlers.
"I think their hearts were in the right place," Leonard-Gilbert said.

To honor the other wrestling coaches in their decision, Team Alberta's coach presented them with a "Fair Play" pin.

Smallest competitor on even plane on skates

Being only 12 years old and weighing only 65 pounds, Northwest Territories' Alana Demko gives up a lot to opponents in the women's 15-19 division in speed skating, but heart isn't one of them.

By far the smallest competitor in her age division, Demko is not even five feet tall. Yet, with the 18-inch blades strapped to her feet, she stands on an even plane with others competing in daily events at the Harry J. McDonald Memorial Center

A resident of Yellowknife, Yukon, Demko has been skating for four years. During the 1994 Games in Slave Lake, she was too young to compete. This year, she and her older brother Mike are part of a powerful NWT team that is taking this sport by storm.

With preliminaries in all four divisions -

500m, 777m, 1,000m and 1,500m completed and some of the finals already being held Tuesday, NWT has qualified more athletes for the title races than the other four countries

In the 500m junior and juvenile male and females races Tuesday morning, NWT often had four or five of the six qualifiers.

One of the more impressive finishes was the one-two showing of NWT teammates Mike Demko and David Monroe in the juvenile men's final. The day's fastest time for the short track 500m was posted by NWT's David

Alana Demko won her qualifying heat of the 1,500m but finished fifth in the 500m final. She competes in three other events Thurs-

Outnumbered five-to-one, Alberta's Michelle Mah of Slave Lake won the junior women's 500m final. Mah had led in her 1.500m qualifying heat before slipping on the next to last lap, allowing Demko to win the heat and advance into the finals.

The Games' Chefs de Mission (or chief of the major participant teams) and other senior officials are being housed in Army guest quar-ters also on Fort Richardson.


Volunteer soldiers are assisting


