

Free lunchtime performances a great cultural opportunity

Greenlandic Mask

The Games' famed culture component launched with enthusiasm Monday.

Noon performances at the Cultural Trading Post, the Prairie Mall and the Second Street Theatre brought lunchtime to life with dancing, drumming and singing.

At the Cultural Trading Post, in the Bowes Family Crystal Gardens, local bands shared the stage with traditional performances Grande Prairie has likely never seen before.

Four young women performed a traditional Greenlandic mask dance. With their faces painted red and black, the dance was at once earthy and eery.

A tradition used for entertainment in their winter camps, the mask dance has been performed in Greenland for 3,000-4,000 years, said Sofie Amondsen, 17, one of the dancers.

Their performance is called "Vaajeerneq," which roughly means "something that makes you awake and alive," in English.

The dancers tell a story through their motions, inspired by the way dogs act towards

each other when they first meet. That is the first part. In the second, the dancers become frightening, mythical beings, Amondsen said, translated by coach Ruth Montgomery-Andersen.

"The reason for doing the mask dance has been to give expression of the sexual fertility rites plus clowning plus to teach children to handle their fears," said Amondsen.

"It's a wonderful feeling inside to be able to bring it to people," she said, of bringing her country's ancient culture to Grande Prairie.

"When you're doing it you have to be 100% into it," said Montgomery-Andersen, "When they're finished they're completely exhausted."

The group will be performing in the other lunchtime performances as well as at the cultural gala. The dancers will move into the audience during the other lunchtime shows, Amondsen said, as it is traditionally done.

"People never did it on stage before," she said, "It was done in their houses, one-on-one."

Team Yamal dancers Muslimat Gadzhieva and Andrey Kozhevim performed the Russian Syra-Syv (Snowflake) with athletic jumps and spins to rhythmic drumming from their artistic director Oleg Rolev.

Along with Wolf Like Shadow and Astronotes – two youthful local bands – the beautiful, bright Bluebird Dancers from Grande Prairie brought a taste of local culture to the show.

Spectator Victoria Abboud was happy to have caught the performance.

"It's a different side of the Games, a more cultural experience," she said, "You're not just watching them play a sport, they're sharing a part of themselves. It's more intimate that way."

She was impressed by the Yamal dancers in particular: "It was high-energy, they didn't seem to tire out."

"It was awesome, nice and bright and col-

ourful," said Linda Craik, Games volunteer co-ordinator.

"It's good to see a little bit of the history," she said, "The cultural part is what makes the Arctic Winter Games unique. It's not just sport, it's all the culture behind it."

The free performances run from noon to 1:30 p.m. today and Wednesday at the Cultural Trading Post, Prairie Mall and Second Street Theatre. A different performance will be in each years each day.

Sibling rivalry designed to push each other to best efforts for Alaska

Alea Robinson and Andrew Noble are brother-and-sister Team Alaska teammates, and head-to-head competitors in the dog mushing event at the 2010 Arctic Winter Games.

While this may lead to bickering in some families, for this pair and their parents it's brought them closer together.

"We're competing with each other and against each other," said Robinson, 14, about the competition with her younger brother.

"I try to be nice. I try to give him the good dogs and stuff."

Noble, 11, said there is a trade-off for the dogs: "She uses the better sleds most of the time."

In the eyes of both kids, there was very little weighing on their mind about competing with each other.

The kids' father Eric Noble said their head-

to-head competition was never really talked about leading up to the Games.

"I don't know why not though," he laughed. The reason is simple said their mother Lois Rockcastle: It's the strong family relationship that has developed because of the kids and families involvement in dog mushing.

"It's definitely something you have to be committed to as a family because it is a lot of work," she said.

"People who have dogs seem to be really family oriented. You see families and their kids are spending a lot of time learning organizational skills, good sportsmanship with helping everybody out. I think it's really good for kids.

"In the races where they are in different groups, Alea helps Andrew to the line or Andrew helps Alea, so it's always a sharing thing."

While Robinson and Noble are racing the same number of dogs - four to five depending on the race - at the Arctic Winter Games, things are much different during training and competitions around their home near Anchorage, Alaska.

"She also uses more dogs then me, I use three to five (dogs) regularly and she uses five to 14," Noble said.

Both recently competed in the 2010 World Junior Championship hosted by the Alaskan Sled Dog and Racing Association over the Feb. 19 weekend.

Andrew finished second in the three-dog class, while Alea finished third in the fivedog class.

Both classes race about 10 kilometres (six miles) three times over the weekend and the musher with the least total time is declared the winner.

For an idea of how fast they travel on the sleds, Robinson finished her race in about 20 minutes, while Noble finished his in about 21

"I like the speed," Noble said. "It varies, but the fastest I've done is 20 miles an hour. "You can go really fast with 16 dogs."

Sixteen dogs!?! While Eric Noble said they don't ride with 16 dogs that often, it's done when they hook up two sleds to the same

"That's a way to give the dogs some weight training," he said.

Training and the competition season follows the snow in Alaska. During the summer, it's the dogs' off-season. In the fall as the snow starts to fall, the dogs begin their training, before competition kicks into full gear when the middle of winter hits.

'You build up the miles and if you can do it more, the more they get loosened up for the season," said Noble about the start of the training season.

While running the dogs in the middle of a -30C cold-snap may sound cruel, they enjoy the weather because it keeps them cool when they are running, Robinson said.

She added the warm weather Grande Prairie has experienced lately - a balmy 5C during Monday's race - is actually harder on the animals.

'We soak them in water before we leave and we make sure they get a lot of water," Robinson said. "When we are out there we just make sure they don't get overheated."

Robinson finished with a bronze medal after Monday's race and her brother finished

Both will have a chance to advance up the podium Wednesday during a 10-km race with five dogs.

GP man skied for Yukon in 1970

Forty years ago, Dave Holway of Grande Prairie was a cross-country skier for Team Yukon, going through a whirlwind of emotions as he travelled from Whitehorse to Yellowknife, to be part of the first Arctic Winter Games.

At 14 years old, it was the first time Holway had been away from home.

"(It was) excitement, fear, wonderment and a great sense of pride too," said Holway.

"There was a lot of fear there. But you were with the team so you have all of that support ... you're meeting competitors from, at that time, the three northern areas – Alaska, Yukon and the Northwest Territories. We had met (the others) here and there, but to get in together to a big meet like that was interesting."

ing."
His team placed fourth in the relay and fifth in the 4.5 kilometre.

That was 1970. Now, in 2010, Holway has

found the Games on his doorstep in Grande Prairie – the furthest south the Games have ever been.

"It can't be called the Arctic Winter Games if it goes much further south," he said.

"That's as far as they can go, I think."

But it is a great showcase of the north, Holway said. It ties the north together. Further south, and they'd tend to be forgotten.

"I lived in Calgary for a few years and (there) you never heard of it – there is nothing up there but the frozen north is what people think. But they'd be surprised," he said.



He is glad to witness the Games up close and personal once again, even if he is a spectator this time. He said the Games are still in his heart – still a part of his life even if it has been 40 years.

For much of the week, Holway – an Alliance Pipeline employee – will be away in Dawson Creek, but he will be back to catch his favourite event of cross-country skiing – as well as a few others.

Sunday night he was at the opening ceremonies, and he called the experience "something special."

"It was great! It was a lot bigger than when we started out. We didn't have the lights or the flash or anything," he said, adding he is not surprised by the Games' evolution in that area

"You've got to have something that grabs people's attention."

In 1970, Holway said, the Games were more about the sports, but culture was still in the picture even then.

"There was a pretty good balance there," he said.

"Culture has always been a big part of the north ... and retaining it.

"The Games are one way of bringing people together to enjoy sports and compete and to bring those cultural foundations together."

Now Holway is excited for this new generation of athletes. For them this is an opportunity to reach for an Olympic level of perfection to their sports.

He suggests these athletes enjoy the moment and never give up.

He also really wanted to say "go Yukon, go!"

"It's really hard not to (root for the Yukon) ... I'm still a Yukoner at heart," said Holway.




