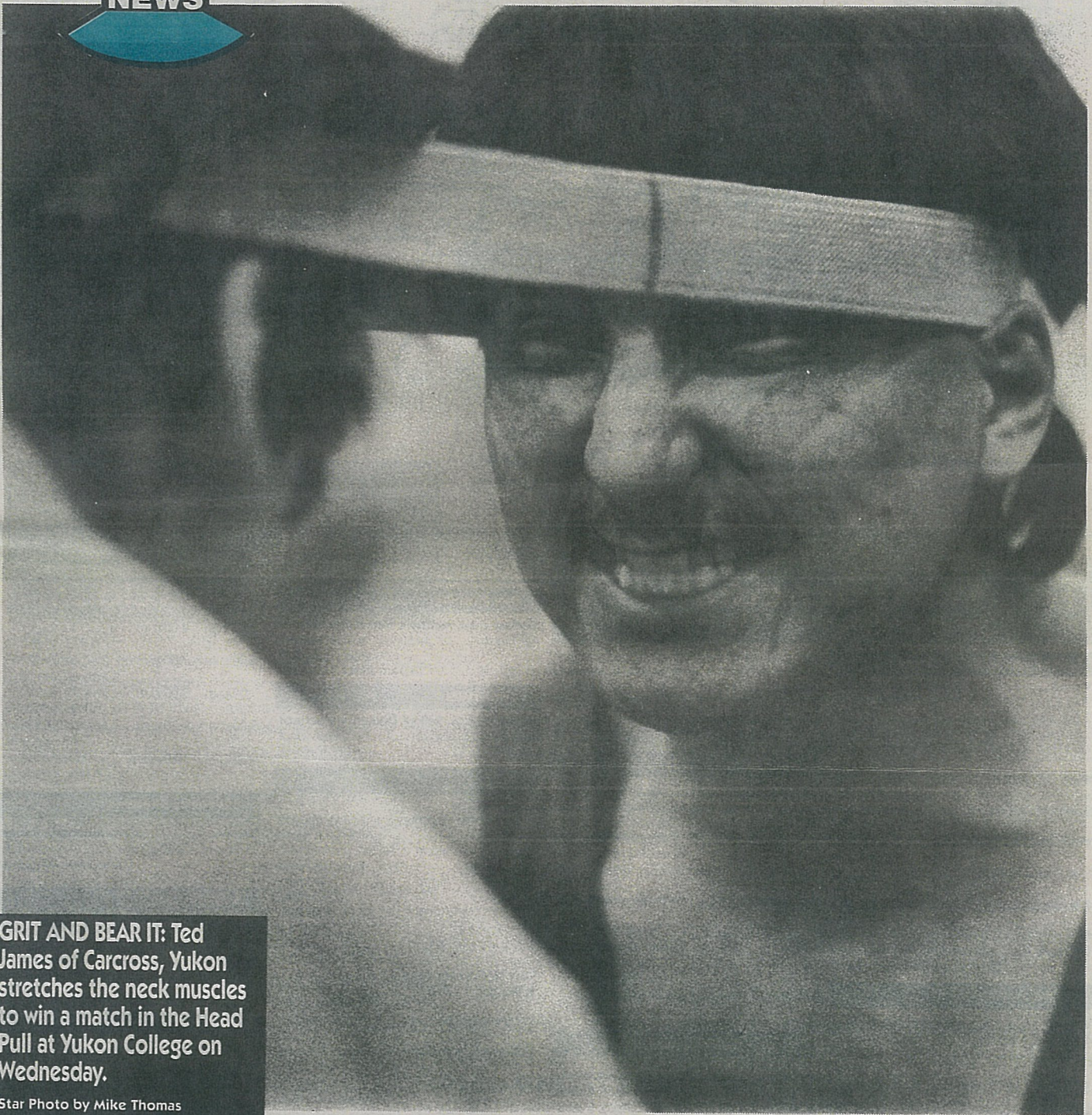

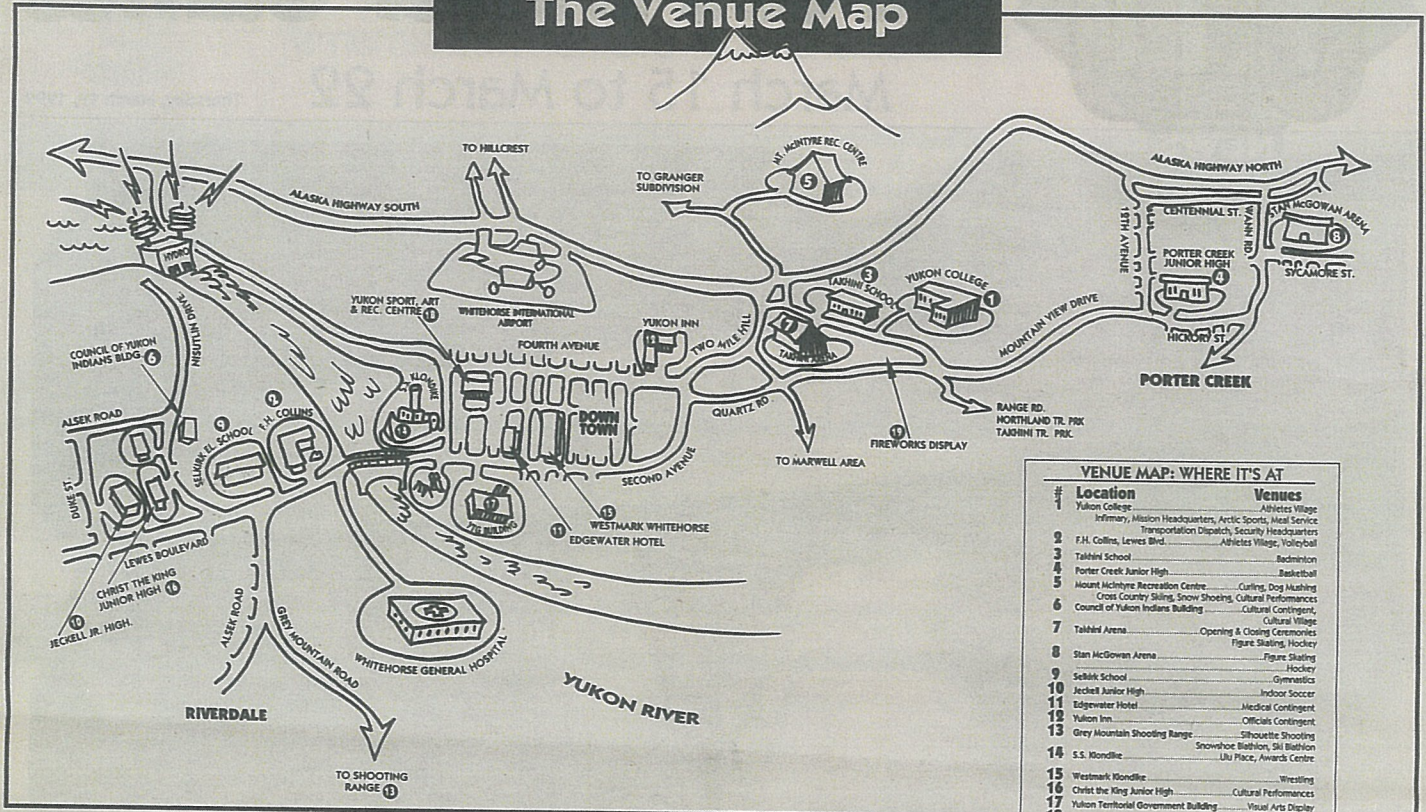

Alaskans pull ahead in ULU standings

Threes were wild on the trails of Mt. McIntyre Wednesday morning.

Alaska's Georgina Gustafson, the Northwest Territories' Jaida Green and the Yukon's Brian Bell all racked up their third gold ulu of the 1992 Arctic Winter Games in the snowshoeing events.

Gustafson (open women) and Green (junior women) gobbled up gold in a 10-kilometre snowshoe jaunt, while Bell brought home his third gold ulu of the Games in Wednesday's 15-km junior men's race.

Included in the field of triple uluists are Yukoners Ross Burnett (two gold, one silver) and Chester Kelly (two silver, one gold) in the open men's division. Kelly captured his first gold of the competition in the open men's 16-km snowshoe circuit.

Ann Nason (open women) and Brent Langbekk (junior men) have each notched three silver ulus in three days of AWG.

In Wednesday's 10-km junior women's race, Alaska's Beth Miller pocketed three second-place finishes, while her teammate, Casey Spencer, finished third for the third time on the third day of competition.

Greenland recently made their presence felt on the badminton courts. Led by gold ulus from Johan Westen (junior men) and Ivalo Mathaussen, the Greenlanders have gathered up six spots on the podium in the shuttlecock shuffle.

Three Greenland silvers were picked up by Peter Torkov (junior men), Matilde Mathaussen, and who else but Else Hoegh (junior women). Closing out the blistering badminton team was Trine Bastiansen with a bronze ulu in juvenile women.

The Americans have proved to be tough to beat in the arctic sports, as the ulus kept rolling in on Wednesday.

The Alaskans received four more gold ulus in the Dene and Inuit Games. Darren Don (junior men arm pull) chalked up his second gold of the Games, while Madeline Gallahorn (junior women arm pull), Shawn Seetomona (open men snowsnake) also finished on top Wednesday. In the pole push, the Alaskan team emerged victoriously.

Late Tuesday, Travis Cronin garnered more Alaska gold by besting his high flying teammate, Brian Randazzo, in the Alaskan high kick. Randazzo settled for silver, while Alex Zaochney placed third.

Also in the Alaskan high kick, Katherine Towarak chipped in a gold ulu for Alaska in the juvenile women category.

As of 5 p.m. on Wednesday, the latest statistical reports indicated the Alaskans beginning to stretch out their lead atop the ulu standings. Alaska had tallied 55 ulus (21 gold, 18 silver, 16 bronze), while the Yukon was next closest at 38 (14 gold, 17 silver, seven bronze).

The Northwest Territories sit in third place with 30 ulus (eight gold, seven silver, 15 bronze), Alberta is in fourth at 12 (three gold, two silver, seven bronze), and a highly skilled Greenland squad rounds out the ulu standings with nine (three gold, four silver, two bronze). The Greenland contingent is much smaller than the four groups that lead them in the ulu count.

The Russian athletes, meanwhile, have been participating in some of the events. They aren't expected to win ulus, however, as they are trying the sports for the first time.

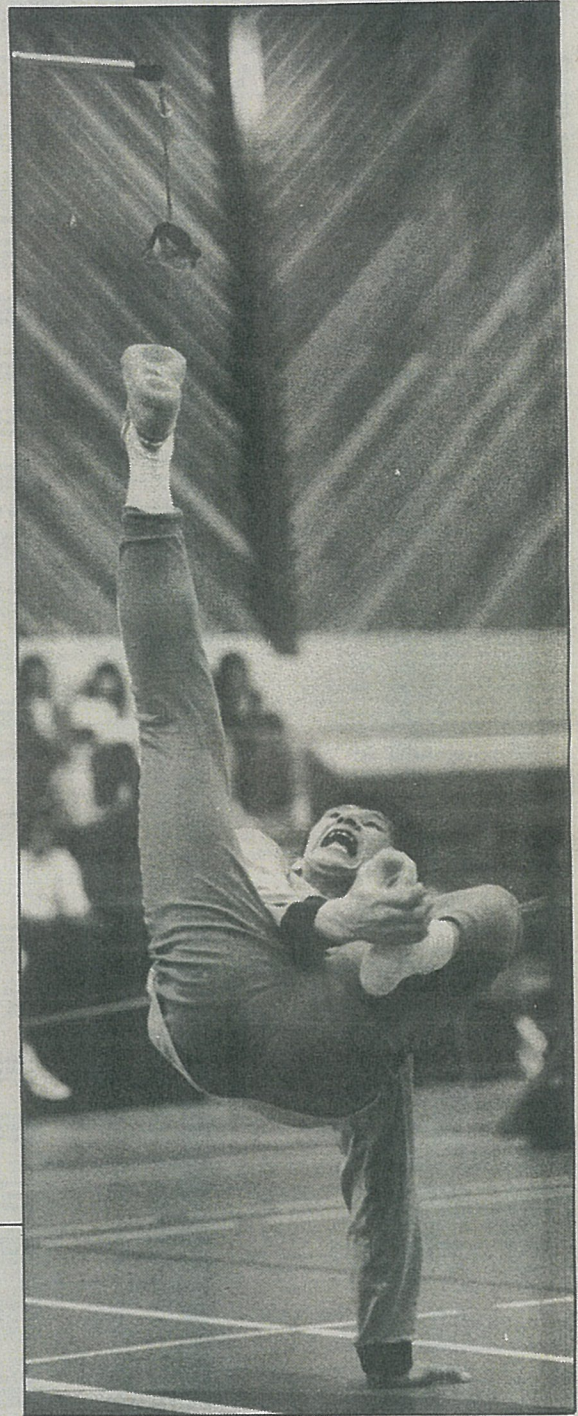

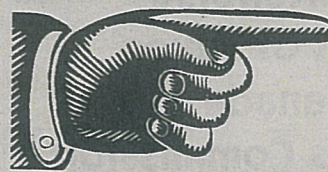

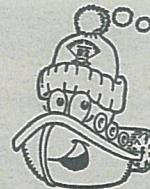
