Months of planning paid off

"Nineteen months of planning has paid off."

Those words were uttered in the Mission Office at Chugiak High School Saturday afternoon moments after Sports Coordinator Loren Smith had been advised that the last event of the 1996 Arctic Winter Games had been completed.

"It went better than expected. The coaches were totally amazed that it went off without a hitch," Smith said.

"There were no sports protests. It shows the coaches and athletes came to participate fairly.

That has not been the case in past Games, Smith said, when five to seven protests were lodged during the week-long competition between seven teams from four nations who share the Arctic environment.

The weight of a rifle, the age of an athlete suspected of being older than listed or even the type of loops on mukluks used by snowshoe competitors have been disputed in the past. Not so this

That may have been the result of the new "fair play" awards which were instituted in 1996 for the first time since the Games began in 1970. Its initiation by the International Committee was the most impressive thing Smith could cite about the events hosted in Chugiak - Eagle River.

Smith himself handed out three

of the awards. One went to "Dr. Mike" and the volunteer medical clinic staff "for duty above and beyond."

Another went to a young alpine skier on Friday whose bronze ulu was reclaimed after a scoring mistake was discovered. The award had already been announced and the embarassing mistake had to be made public. Smith awarded the fair play pin after she graciously relinquished

"It made a difference to her," Smith said of the recognition.

The third went to snowshoe

sport coordinator Rick Wilson and the Northwest Territories team. The NWT team made a concession to teams from Yukon Territory and Alaska - a concession which cost them a medal.

In the snowshoe relay, each contingent was allowed to enter two teams. Yukon and Alaska were one person short of having enough for a second team.

"The question was raised, could an athlete compete twice, for the first team in one leg of the race and in another leg of the second team's race," Wilson explained.

NWT had two full teams. Had they refused to allow a racer to compete on both teams, they would have been assured a medal Their answer, however, was yes. When the race was over, NWT was not among the top three teams and gained no ulu.

Smith presented the fair play award to each member of the team. "I'm confident they knew (the concession) could cost them the medal."




Vova Mishunine Arctic Sports Team Tyumen



Arctic Winter Games Possible

Team Alaska skiers take 18 gold ulus

Team Alaska cross-country skiers brought home 18 gold, silver and bronze ulus from the relays in the final day of Arctic Winter Games competition Saturday.

The midget team of Jesi Kinnevan, Tara Hamilton and Diana Johnson skied their way to a gold medal in the 3x3 kilometer classic relay. Their winning combined time of 33 minutes, 39 seconds put them ahead of second place Alberta by six minutes. The trio held the top three places all week long.

The national anthem of the United States played a second time after the midget boys' relay. Ben Crawford, Josh Broda and Zachary

Hill finished two minutes ahead of second place Alberta with a time of 31 minutes, 44 seconds.

Team Alaska juvenile females were not about to be shown up by their teammates. Greta Lewanski, Sara Rottman and Rachel James easily skied to a first place finish in the 3x5 kilometer classic relay. Alaska had a two-minute lead over second place Greenland.

Alaska's juvenile boys had a little trouble with directions in their 3x5 kilometer race. After he finished his second lap, Eric Strabel accidentally took a left onto the bypass instead of a right to go to the exchange zone. Strabel did a 180 degree turn when he realized his mistake. He slipped through a break in the fencing with one of the best turns seen throughout the day and successfully corrected his mistake. Team Alaska fin-ished second, 35 seconds behind Greenland with a time of 48 minutes,

The friendly spirit of competition was present in the junior female race. Team Tyumen was disqualified; Tyumen acknowledged and accepted their mistake. Their good sportsmanship earned them a "fair play" pin. Leslie Boyd, Sarah West and Ruthie Sadler of Team Alaska finished second behind Magadan with a time of 55 minutes, 21 sec-

Though the Russian teams took gold and silver, Alaska junior males proved they were on the same level with a third place finish. Patrick Curley, Joe Maddry and Forrest Kuiper skied to the finish with a time of 45 minutes, 32 seconds.

Team Yukon skiers have fun

The long, steep drive up Arctic Valley Road was worth the trip to get a mini-lesson on life in the great Yukon Territory.

Team Yukon alpine skiers Jeff Faulkner and Moritz Schmidt, both from Whitehorse, gave teammate Russell Gouthro a hard time about his town of origin, Dawson City

2,000 people live in Dawson in the winter, sort of city. as opposed to a Things happen whopping 22,000, too fast, you have which was the first alpine medal year 'round, in to be on time ..." for a Territory with a population of 27,000.

Dawson's population swells to 10,000 in the summer, though, due to the Territory's number-one industry, tourism, Schmidt said.

Industry might not be the best word, since it connotes factory production. And that kind of industry is more than scarce in the Yukon.

"There's not one factory in the Yukon - not one single factory," Schmidt advised.

Now - back to the Territory's population. Let's put it in perspec-tive: Yukon Territory is twice the size of Germany, yet the population of Germany is about 80 million, Schmidt said.

Wow. So much land. So few people.

But that's just fine with these

"I can't stand any sort of city. Things happen too fast, you have to be on time, it (stinks)," Faulkner

Anyway, the young men have at least enjoyed their Winter Games experience.

'As a team, we've been doing pretty good," said Faulkner.

They commented that the conditions at Alpenglow were "icy perfect race conditions, but (the mountain) needs more snow,

Apparently, Team Alaska members usually have three more months to train than Team Yukon's, since the first snowfall in Alaska is usually in October.


In the Yukon, the first snows usually hit in December or January, they said.

Team Yukon also trains less frequently, only once a week compared to three or more times for Team Alaska. The discrepancy is due to a shortage of coaches, they said. And no wonder — there's a

But neither Faulkner, Schmidt or Gouthro mind.

"Let's keep it that way - no people - it's better," Faulkner said.



Alaska girls nudged out the ukon by a hair-splitting .175 point; heir scores were 106.525 and 06.35, said Laurie Ray, technical presentative for gymnastics. WT came in third with a score of

Dan Henry, Team Yukon's girls oach agreed that, despite losing Alaska by the slimmest of marns, he and his team remain pleased ith their performances.

"It was pretty darn close and at's the nature of the sport. This what the sport is about - a small ror can result in a win or loss.

"We were very happy with our ore, because we did extremely ell," he said.

Team NWT boys coach Ed ennington said that because his am is younger — with a 9-year-d, two 10-year-olds and a 12-year-- with a 9-yearwith little competition experiice, he didn't think they were likely

"We came with the idea of doing the best we could and enjoying our-

However, Bennington's team had improved their performances by three to four points between the first and second days of competition, he

At the top of Alaska's girls team is Kirsten Landmesser. Landmesser, who lives in Eagle River, won a whopping six gold ulus, in vault, bars, beam, floor and all-around as well as one for the team.

"I had, like, the best meet of my entire life. I felt really good about it," she said.

Lanvadder credits Landmesser with the Team Alaska win

"I think that one of the things that was really nice to see is the maturity in Kirsten Landmesser.

I think that it was her age and length of time in the sport that made her so solid on everything," Lanvadder said.

The other team members tended to make errors in at least one of the events they competed in, probably due to their ages and inexperience, she said.

And the 430 spectators at the competitions didn't help either, Lanvadder said. "They cracked (because of the pressure)," she said.

The youth and inexperience of team members seemed to concern all the coaches present at the interview. Currently, the maximum age for girls gymnastics at AWG is 16, and boys is 14. The coaches expressed a desire to raise the maximum age to

While Landmesser was pleased with her performance, she was impressed with the effort put forth by Team Yukon.
"We were really close, actually.

Their skills were a lot cleaner and they (didn't get that many points taken off for errors). They met all the requirements," she said.

Jeanette Holt of Team Alaska also enjoyed her Games experience. 'I had fun because they had Canadian rules and the requirements are easy. And if you get all the requirements, then you can get a 10," she said. Holt won the silver ulu in the

all-around competition.
Fraser Lennie of NWT said that he was able to pick up some pointers during the competition.

"When I got here and saw them do their moves, I tried to do them and it helped me a lot. It was a good experience," he said.

Lennie also commented on the facilities at the Anchorage Gymnastics Association, where the competition was held.

"Here they have a spring floor -NWT only has mats. Spring floor is a lot easier to tumble on. It's re-

Yukon's Jordan Clark found the

competition difficult. "I think it was harder to compete this year 'cause I wasn't in gymnastics for a year and I decided to come back." His coach said he was glad to have him back on the team.

Heather Lang, also of Yukon, said, "This has been my best competition ever, 'cause I felt good during my competitions, and I did good." Lang won the bronze ulu for the beam event, which is usually her poorest event, she said.

"She dislikes it the most, but she did very well at it," said coach


